Background:

I am a happily married 32 year-old with a 16 month old daughter. I am a born and raised Calgarian with more than a decade in the workforce after graduating high school. My decision to return to school after a 10 year hiatus was made after significant reflection on what was best for my family and me. I am a first year Psychology major with aspirations of going to law school upon completing my degree at MRU. I enjoy reading, watching movies, playing sports and spending time with friends and family.

Why am I running for President of the Student Association?

I believe that my life experience and my knowledge of the non-academic facets of an organization combined with a proven ability to manage a team with successful results will prove invaluable to maintaining and enhancing an already highly respected group of people. I have uncovered some areas that need work and believe that I have the motivation and the ability to correct these issues along with the rest of the Executive and Student Council.

The key points for my decision are:

1. An opportunity to meet new people and share my wealth of knowledge in an effort to make a great institution even better.
2. Provide a better all-around experience for students which will hopefully equate to a happier, more productive environment for students attending the institution.

Key Campaign Points:

1. Keep Your Money in Your Pocket

Take a critical look at the current budget and processes to determine where cuts can be made without sacrificing essential services in an attempt to keep more of student's money in student pockets. Streamline current processes and eliminate redundancy.

2. Increase, Enhancement or Elimination of Services Offered

Careful and critical analysis of current services being offered and formulate plans to enhance them to provide greater access and convenience. Selectively formulate plans to reduce or eliminate services not being used to provide additional funds for more active services or for potential return to students as a reduction in fees. Actively solicit student population for ideas regarding current and potential future services.

3. More Efficient Scholarship Application Process

The scholarship application system is far too complicated for what it could be. I'm advocating for a "Scholarship for Dummies" system where a computerized system determines your eligibility based on a series of questions then allows you to apply for any or all in only a few minutes.

4. Increase Outside Performers at MRU

Introduce the idea of allowing various festivals including, but not limited to the folk, jazz and fringe festival to perform on campus during their respective scheduled events. Establish a regular schedule of bands and other groups to play in Wyckham House throughout the school year.

5. Safer Safewalk

Advocate for better lighting in the parking lots at night, heated and semi-contained bus shelters at the East & West gates, improved night time lighting at the bus stops on campus and speak with the city in regards to improving late hour bus scheduling, especially during peak times such as exams, sports events or concerts.

6. Increased Communication & Visibility

Increase the visibility and communication between Student Council, especially between the Executive and the general student body. Eliminate the elitist stigma that has been placed on the Students Association. Actively engage the student population for ideas and suggestions for what is working and what is not.

What I did:

- Went to Ottawa and lobbied for accessibility on Parliament Hill, met with Ministers, Members of Parliament, and Senators
- Was elected as the Director of Advancement for the Alberta Students' Executive Council (ASEC), our provincial lobby group, and created the strategic plan, which will guide ASEC for the next 4 years

 - That event and the work we did going into the civic election, has now built a strong relationship with city hall and Mayor Nenshi.

What I will do:

Transportation: Work with the city and institution to help find solutions to our problems getting to and from campus:

- Ensuring the previously promised downtown shuttle bus becomes a reality
 - Work with the University to develop new ideas for parking in and around campus, for example, time-share passes and new lots off-campus
- Textbooks:** After tuition, textbooks are a huge expense for students:
- Establish a textbook bursary for students
 - Work with the VP Academic when speaking with the Library, and bookstore.
 - Continue to speak with Government about regulations, legislation, and the copyright act.

Funding: Education is a right, not a privilege; therefore, everyone should have the right to post secondary education. There are already many barriers for those seeking admittance to school; funding should not be as large an obstacle as it is:

- Work with our lobby groups, ASEC, CASA, and other partners, to establish a 'Rainy Day fund' for Post-Secondary education so that funding is not solely dependent on annual Province and Federal Government budgeting.

Your voice. My passion.

Your voice is my passion. This statement only works, as well as my role as External Vice President, if I know what students want to say. This means that I am going to make some initial assumptions about knowing what students want. Students want to be able to pay for school, get to school and afford housing while attending school. For these reasons, I build my campaign on a subject concerning all students across Mount Royal University: cost.

Cost of living

It is a well-known issue that the price of housing in Calgary is simply expensive. No matter where you are in the city, especially around Mount Royal University, housing costs are through the roof—pun intended. Full-time students are finding themselves working part-time (and sometimes full-time) to support basic needs, ultimately sacrificing grades or extending their studies. In my manifesto, the student voice supports secondary housing suites.

Cost of living includes transportation. Mount Royal, bypassed by the City's West LRT project, still has insufficient modes of transportation. Limited shuttles, routes and time schedules add to the extended period of time students must spend commuting to and from school, if they use transit at all. Transit is no longer an option for some and when a car becomes a necessity in the middle of a thriving city, something must be done!

Out of a roster of post-secondary institutions including St. Mary's, ACAD, University of Calgary and SAIT, Mount Royal is paying one of the highest U-Pass fees. I propose we lobby Calgary Transit to lower the fee, or give us transit around Mount Royal worth paying for.

Cost of learning

The average debt of a University undergrad is \$24,000 in Alberta. This crippling debt hinders student return on investment for their education, leaving him or her less likely to own a home or have savings upon graduation. Investment in student success is imperative to having an equal opportunity educational system for all students, not just well-off students. This means putting our voices behind loan remission programs, supporting interest-free borrowing, and increasing scholarships and bursaries.

Cost of leverage

We cannot afford a weak voice. I believe in student governance, transparent governance to be exact. The student body exerts power to change policies and procedures. As a public relations student, I have come to know best practices in communication, which I agree, is a two-way symmetrical system respecting the organization and its public. One of the reasons why I am running for the Students' Association is because the organization is its public.

Your voice is my passion. I implore you to voice any and every concern to the appropriate role in the Students' Association. This is an ongoing invitation to honour your voice in SAMRU affairs. I realize that there is no time like the present; inaction, in my opinion, is not an option. German writer Meister Eckhart said it best: "The price of inaction is far greater than the cost of making a mistake."

ELECTION PLATFORM:

The Students' Association of Mount Royal University vision is "to help students discover themselves, build relationships, and make a difference in the world." To achieve these goals student's lives revolve around their academics and need understanding and support in order to be successful at Mount Royal University.

I have been a student of MRU for the past three years and am majoring in History in the Bachelor of Arts Program. The past two years I have been involved with the Student's Association of Mount Royal University as a member of Student's Council, currently holding the position of Commissioner to the Vice President Academic.

As a student, a member of Students' Council, a member of the General Faculties Council, and an employee on campus, I have been able to see and experience what it takes for a student to succeed academically at Mount Royal University. Student input on faculty decision is extremely important, even more so than before, as Mount Royal continues to grow as a university. As Vice President Academic, I would:

- set up the resources student's need so that their voices would never be lost as the University grows
- continue to work on the co-curricular record from the previous Vice President Academic
- create a greater sense of community between the faculty and students
- ensure the Library hours stay as is and are not cut
- create more study space so students can work on campus and have the study space and computer availability available to them
- update how the teacher evaluations are performed and the questions asked
- work with the faculty to create a Faculty Code of Conduct
- continue to work on the Textbook Loan Program

SAMRU ELECTIONS

The Students' Association of Mount Royal University is the collective voice of its members. We create change through advocacy, we inspire growth through engagement and we serve students to help them succeed. The responsibilities associated with this mandate are immense. The Students' Association ensures that all students are well-represented on approximately 100 academic and non-academic committees and boards on and off campus. In addition, the Association provides students with avenues for personal growth and development outside of the classroom. The Students' Association also operates businesses and services that are designed to help students get through each day.

The Students' Association of Mount Royal University (SAMRU) has over 12,000 active members, 18 Students' Councillors (14 non-executive and 4 executive positions), 91 full- and part-time staff, over 300 volunteers a year, and an annual operating budget of \$6.99 million.

Students' Council is collectively the highest decision-making body of SAMRU and also a policy-making Board of Directors for the Students' Association.

Four Students' Association executives are elected by and from the active members of the association to carry out the governance and executive functions of the Students' Association:

- President
- Vice President External
- Vice President Academic
- Vice President Student Life

Executives are members of Students' Council and deal with issues like tuition and loan policies, student advocacy and lobbying, academic appeals, and external relations. Executives provide student representation on a number of key university and government committees.

Executive terms normally end on May 15 of each year. Each executive member is a full-time volunteer of the Students' Association and must take one course per semester (excluding the Spring and Summer terms), maintain a grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 or higher, and keep full-time office hours. Executives are paid monthly honoraria during their terms.

The elected Students' Councillors serve a one-year term of office from the 1st of May following elections. Councillors are full-time students and part-time volunteers of the Students' Association who must maintain a GPA of 2.0 or higher. Any council vacancies are filled by appointment in the fall of each year.

All active members of the Students' Association are able to vote in the election. Active members are full- and part-time students who are taking credit courses. Voting is on February 7, 8 and 9, with online voting running from January 31 to midnight February 5, 2011

RULES & REGULATIONS

All active members of the Students' Association of Mount Royal University (SAMRU) are able to vote in the election. Active members are full and part time students who are taking credit courses.

In each winter semester, elections are held to determine who will be on the next year's Executive Committee and Students' Council. Full-time credit students, maintaining a GPA of 2.0 or higher, are eligible to run for any of the four Executive positions and the ten elected Students' Council positions.

The Chief Returning Officer (CRO) is responsible for maintaining the integrity of the elections. The CRO is completely independent of the SAMRU, even though this appointment is approved by Students' Council.

The CRO reviews all nomination applications to ensure that potential candidates meet the criteria set out in the Elections Policies. All candidates are expected to complete the nomination form thoroughly and accurately. Incomplete forms or inaccurate information result in disqualification.

The CRO also oversees campaigning and voting. Clear policies are in place which determine how, when and where candidates may campaign. Policies also state who may actually vote in the elections. The CRO's decisions are considered final, unless candidates decide to appeal the decision.

An Appeal Board, another body independent of the Students' Association, reviews any notices of appeal to decide whether or not there are sufficient grounds for a hearing. If the Appeal Board decides to hear a case, the candidate is asked to appear to present the required information. Any decision handed down by the Appeal Board is final.
